The Memorial Classic Scholarships are supported by proceeds from the annual Tom Johnson Memorial Classic golf tournament. Moreover, the Foundation '45 Scholarships honor the Foundation's inaugural year, 1945. The Foundation also promotes the Brenda Renee Horn and Steve Mack Memorial Scholarships in partnership with the SCI National Scholarship Program.

The Foundation's academic scholarship program runs in two annual cycles - spring and fall. The next application window is September 15-November 1, 2025.





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

What The Federal Government Shutdown Means To Your Clients

Congress failed to reach an agreement on funding beginning October 1, 2025. As a result, the federal government is shut down until further notice. We recognize that your organization plays a critical role, and we want to provide you with information to help you guide the people you serve.

We want you to know that during the federal government shutdown, payments to all people who currently receive Social Security benefits and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) will continue with no change in payment dates. Your clients will still receive their payments on time.

To help manage their benefits and access important services, please encourage your clients to create an online my Social Security account at www.ssa.gov/myaccount/. With a personal my Social Security account, your clients can view benefit estimates, request a proof of income letter, apply for benefits, request a replacement Social Security card or Medicare card, and much more. It's easy, convenient, and secure.

Our local offices will remain open to the public but will provide reduced services. During this time, your clients can still:

- Apply for benefits
- Request an appeal
- Change their address or direct deposit information
- Report a death
- Verify or change their citizenship status
- Replace a lost or missing Social Security payment
- Obtain a critical payment
- Change a representative payee
- Make a change in their living arrangement or income (SSI recipients only)
- Obtain a new or replacement Social Security card

Hearings offices remain open to conduct hearings before an Administrative Law Judge (ALJ). Please be aware that we may not be able to assist with all in-person service requests at this time. For example, we cannot provide proof of benefits letters, or update or correct earnings records. These in-person services will resume when the federal government is operating normally.

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Employees Posting Personal Opinions on Social Media: What Can Employers Act Upon?

As more and more employees use social media as major communication tools, employers must know what they can and can't do when it comes to disciplining or even terminating employees for their social media use. Employees going to social media to share their personal opinions on topics such as the assassination of Charlie Kirk has caused employers to consider where the "line" is as to how they can respond to protect the good name and reputation of their company.

Whether employees post, comment, or otherwise engage in social media activity, employers can generally act on such conduct as they would if it occurred in the workplace. But there are several protections that may be available to an employee facing discipline for their postings. These include laws prohibiting harassment and violence, laws protecting whistleblowers, and employees who complain about workplace conditions.

Legal Considerations

- Private-sector and most non-profit employers are not bound by the First Amendment's free speech protections, which only restrict government action.
- Several states including California, Colorado, and New York – have statutes protecting employees from retaliation for lawful off-duty conduct. In addition, Connecticut. Louisiana, Minnesota, South Carolina, and Wyoming are among the states that specifically protect off-duty political activity. These laws may prevent employers from firing or disciplining employees for expressing their personal views unless those views have a clear, material impact on the business.
- Even without a directed state law, the federal National Labor Relations Act (NLRA) could also provide your employees with protection. If the social media use relates, even indirectly, to the employee's terms and conditions of employment, it may qualify as protected "concerted activity." This is especially true if the post touches on workplace issues shared by coworkers (e.g., wages, benefits, and working conditions as defined by the NLRA).

SESCO's Guidance on What Employers Should and Cannot Include in Social Media Policy

What not to include:

 Prohibitions on work-related discussions: Employees have a legal right to discuss jobs, wages, working conditions, and other employment issues.

- Restrictions on social connections: Avoid language that limits employees from "friending" or connecting with coworkers online.
- Requests for private social media credentials: Do not require employees to share their account passwords.
- Bans on pay or benefits discussions: Preventing these conversations can violate labor laws.
- Prohibitions on media contact: While employees have the right to speak to the media, you can require them to specify what they say as individuals, not company representatives.

What to include:

- Clear examples of unacceptable behavior: Specify that hate speech, discrimination, bullying, retaliation, threats of violence or condoning acts of violence on social media platforms will not be tolerated and may result in disciplinary action up to and including termination.
- Provide practical, easy-to-understand rules that apply to employee behavior online:
- Respect company values: Encourage employees to align their online conduct with the company's values.
 Make sure the company's values are known to them.
- Update privacy settings: Employees must regularly review and update their social media privacy settings.
- Do not share internal information: Prohibit posting confidential business information, financial details, or sensitive customer information.
- Think before you post: Remind employees that posts can have personal and professional consequences.
- Comply with specific state laws.

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America 250 Oregon Commission Launches Oregon 250 Grant Program

The America 250 Oregon Commission, in partnership with Oregon Heritage and the Oregon Historical Society, is excited to announce the <u>Oregon 250 Grant Program</u>, supporting projects that commemorate the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States. This grant program helps organizations create inclusive, community-focused projects that highlight Oregon's diverse histories, traditions, and cultures.

Eligible organizations — including nonprofits, local governments, public schools, universities, colleges, and federally recognized tribes in Oregon — may apply for grants of up to \$5,000. Funding can support events, exhibitions, educational programming, collections development, research, and interpretation. Projects must align with the mission of America 250 Oregon and one or more of its seven guideposts, which are:

- To inspire Oregonians to participate in the work of forming a more perfect union.
- To highlight the importance of civics and history education in building a better future.
- To highlight the work of Oregon's many history and heritage organizations.
 To encourage a robust, thorough, and honest examination
- of our collective history.

 To celebrate the unique traditions, arts, and cultures of
- communities throughout Oregon.

 To honor the service and sacrifice made by Oregon's
- veterans.
- To celebrate the power of place through Oregon's remarkable landscapes and scenic beauty.

A total of \$100,000 in funding is available, with 50% dedicated to rural communities. This funding was provided by the Oregon State Legislature to the Oregon Historical Society for the purpose of supporting the work of the America 250 Oregon Commission.

"We are grateful to the Oregon State Legislature for providing funds that will encourage Oregonians across our state to create opportunities to commemorate this once-in-a-generation moment in our nation's history," said Kerry Tymchuk, Chair of the America 250 Oregon Commission and Executive Director of the Oregon Historical Society.

Grants are awarded on a first-come, first-served basis to eligible projects, with two funding cycles:

- Cycle 1: September 15-November 1, 2025
- Cycle 2: January 1-March 1, 2026

The grant period runs through June 30, 2027, and applications are now being accepted.

Are You Aware Of Incorrectly Denied Veteran Burial Transportation Benefits?

NFDA has been made aware of significant issues related to the reimbursement of burial transportation benefits for veterans from January 2023 through March 2024. These problems stem from errors in the Veterans Benefits Administration's (VBA) automated claims processing system.

Specifically, the system:

- Prematurely denied valid claims.
- Failed to reimburse transportation expenses even when supporting evidence was submitted.
- Did not notify claimants of decisions regarding transportation benefits.

As a result, it is estimated that:

- Approximately 1,300 claims were underpaid by a total of \$743,000.
- Around 4,700 claims were processed without proper notification to claimants.

The VBA processes claims for transportation reimbursement as follows.

Eligibility:

- Transportation reimbursement covers reasonable expenses incurred to transport a veteran's remains from the place of death to the final resting place.
- Eligibility expanded under the "Johnny Isakson and David P. Roe, M.D. Veterans Health Care and Benefits Improvement Act of 2020," which became effective January 5, 2023. It includes veterans who died while under VA care, were receiving compensation or pension at the time of death, or whose remains were unclaimed.

Required Evidence:

- VBA requires an itemized receipt or statement showing the name of the deceased veteran, the nature and cost of services and transportation, the name of the claimant, and the dates of services rendered.
- Statements or receipts do not need to show "paid in full," only that expenses were incurred.

Informant Telephone Number On Death Certificates

A common question we receive is "Why does the informant telephone number not appear on death certificates that are printed from OVERS?"

The number doesn't print because our death certificates are based on the National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) template. That template is accepted as a national standard, and it includes a field for the informant's phone number. However, this is not a field that exists in OVERS. As a result, death certificates printed out of OVERS will instead have the informant's telephone number automatically filled with "Not Available.

29. Place of Death
Decedent's Residence

We recognize this can result in confusion for families. We hope to address this issue in an upcoming update to OVERS or through a format change to the death record.

Government Shutdown: Impact On VA Services

As you know, on October 1, the federal government "shut down." During the current lapse in funding, the vast majority of VA benefits and services will continue uninterrupted, but the government shutdown is not without consequences to VA. The following critical Veterans care and assistance programs *will be* impacted by the government shutdown:

- VA will not provide Veteran career counseling or transition assistance program activities.
- The GI Bill Hotline will be closed.
- VA regional benefits offices will be closed.
- VA will cease public affairs and outreach to Veterans.
- VA will not permanently place headstones or maintain the grounds at VA national cemeteries.
- VA will not process applications for pre-need burials.
- VA will not print new presidential memorial certificates.

Jan 1 Starting January 1, 2026, Oregon law requires death records to be completed in the state's electronic reporting system called OVERS.

[Oregon Revised Statute 432.133(1)(a)]

Funeral directors will no longer have the option to print a paper record for medical certifiers.



OVERS is a secure web-based system that can be accessed using any browser.

To get an OVERS account, submit the following to Oregon Vital Records.

- 2. Two pieces of ID

House Bill 3127 Requirement To Complete Death Records Electronically

Dear Funeral Directors.

As many of you are already aware, the passage of House Bill 3127 requires that death records be registered electronically using OVERS. The effective date for the bill is January 1, 2026.

We are communicating with the Oregon Medical Association, Oregon Nurses Association and Oregon Society of Physician Associates to get their assistance in informing medical certifiers about the new law. We plan to communicate directly with medical certifiers who are currently not using OVERS and encourage them to begin using OVERS as soon as possible so they are comfortable with the system by the time the law goes into effect.

To help spread information about the passage of the bill and how medical certifiers can enroll in OVERS, we created a handout that can be given to certifiers that ask for a drop to paper record.



The webpage includes information about enrolling in OVERS, OVERS training videos, and helpful resources. Providing Death Certificates To Cemeteries

According to Oregon Administrative Rules 333-011-0335(8), death certificates issued to funeral home staff can only be transferred to someone who would be eligible themselves to order the death certificate. Eligible relations are outlined in Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 432.380(2)(c)(B)(iii).

If a cemetery is carrying out a prearrangement trust fund, described in ORS 97.943, funeral home staff (referred to in the statute as 'certified provider') may order a death certificate and provide it to the cemetery because the cemetery when acting as 'master trustee' has a property right need for the certificate that is acceptable to the State Registrar that makes them eligible. It wouldn't be ideal for cemetery staff to order the certificate directly, as additional documentation would be needed to prove their need, and ORS 97.943 (2) says the death certificate should be provided by the certified provider.

NFDA Supports New Legislation to Ensure Timely, Dignified Burials for Veterans

NFDA is supporting the Veterans Burial Accountability Act (HR 4398), a bipartisan bill introduced by Rep. Tom Emmer (R-Minn), majority whip of the U.S. House of Representatives. It would ensure veterans receive the timely, dignified burial services they deserve.

The bill would require Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) clinicians to sign death certificates within 48 hours of a veteran's death. HR 4398 provides a sensible solution that respects the service and dignity of veterans, and ensures their families are not forced to delay burial or cremation. This legislation reflects the same mission of honoring veterans with respect, compassion and integrity that funeral service professionals uphold every day. NFDA has long advocated for improved funeral and burial benefits for those who served our country.

As the nation's leading voice for funeral service, NFDA believes that no veteran should experience delays or indignities in their final arrangements. The association's support for this bill reaffirms its ongoing commitment to honoring the sacrifices of U. S. military heroes.

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
